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Problem



People aren't willing to explore and get out of their comfort zone while cooking because it is not *enjoyable* enough.

Solution



A Social Cooking App that incentivizes individuals to explore cooking by offering unique challenges, virtual rewards, and opportunities for interactions with other users

Primary Users



Young adults living independently for the first time, who need some extra motivation to start cooking and getting out of their zone in a safe environment.

Name, One-Liner, Value Proposition



Name: Let 'em Cook!

We wanted a name that emphasized our app's fun nature, as well as embodying the efforts of people trying new things with new ingredients, and how trusting the process and having faith in oneself can shine through as a novel, fun experience!

One-Liner

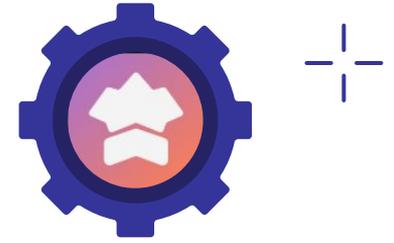
“Make your kitchen a playground!”

SIMILARITIES

Social/guiding app. Promotes cooking "challenges" (recipes to follow) and "duels" to cook with friends. Goal: Make cooking not feel "like a chore".

DIFFERENCES / WHAT MAKES US UNIQUE

We make cooking fun via not only competition, but social validation (sharing photos, interactions with strangers). Our challenges are open-ended prompts that inspire more creativity and truly Let 'Em Cook. Our solution emphasizes getting out of one's comfort zone so users grow as individuals. Spice relies on "quick tips" rather than a habit of exploration.

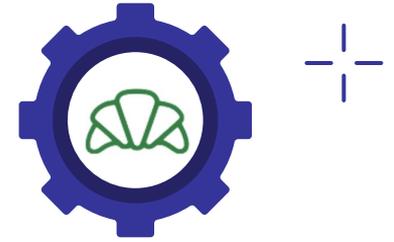
WHAT WORKS/DOESN'T

Worked: Sharing creations with friends and inviting them to a video chat to cook with you at the same time. **Doesn't:** interactive globe for community aspect

IMPLICATIONS

Interacting with friends is easier to implement; interacting with strangers is where our app shines! Also, allowing more open-ended freedom and creativity will let people truly discover the fun of cooking!

FoodDex



SIMILARITIES

Encourages exploring new culinary cultures with badges as reward for a "passport." Users can share photos **with friends** and choose recommended recipes to get started cooking. Has consideration for dietary restrictions.

DIFFERENCES / WHAT MAKES US UNIQUE

Our app provides recommendations to users not based solely on a country of origin of the dish, but on other aspects such as ingredients and dietary restrictions. Our social aspect allows sharing with both friends and the larger world. Our app's competitive feature allows for more active involvement and interaction among users to keep everyone engaged.

WHAT WORKS/DOESN'T

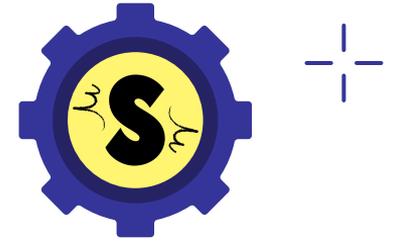
Worked: Sharing creations with friends and virtual badges/passport.

Doesn't: Self-selection and task initiation for recipes was a lot for inexperienced cooks.

IMPLICATIONS

Our app's ability to share with strangers sets us apart! Collection for virtual rewards appears to be a valid incentive. For our tasks, we need to make task initiation easier, and reduce mental load on users - such as limiting their choices of recipe/challenge.

Sidekick by Sorted Food



SIMILARITIES

Goal of having less experienced cooks experiment with cooking and broaden horizons. Will provide list of groceries to purchase to fulfil a recipe.

DIFFERENCES / WHAT MAKES US UNIQUE

Sidekick has no social/competitive aspect. Our users can input/have choice on their challenges, where Sidekick provides a shopping list and recipes with minimal agency. Sidekick has no consideration for dietary restrictions

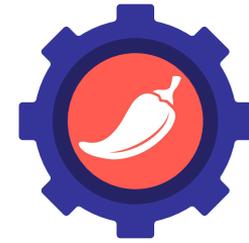
WHAT WORKS/DOESN'T

Worked: provides a list of ingredient to purchase for a recipe. **Doesn't:** users have minimal choice, and some **cannot** follow recipe based on dietary restrictions

IMPLICATIONS

An important part of our design becoming successful is the diversity of challenges users can experience in the app, and the agency they have in creating and undertaking them. User input will keep things diverse, and keep our app engaging!

Pepper



SIMILARITIES

Social app to encourage cooking through seeing your feed and interacting. Includes a virtual charcuterie board to decorate after participating in the app's features.

DIFFERENCES / WHAT MAKES US UNIQUE

Our virtual decoration process is more personable (choose the rewards you want to accessorize your parasocial pal, instead of adding foods to a charcuterie board). Our competitive aspect is also unique.

WHAT WORKS/DOESN'T

Worked: Having a feed of **recipes** that others, including pro chefs, post. **Doesn't:** Dietary restrictions are self-filter, integration into daily life wasn't smooth for most.

IMPLICATIONS

We should be aware of moderation, since Pepper's lack of moderation made the app feel "intense" to use. Also, integration into a daily routine was hard for Pepper users who had to search recipes themselves. Easy to choose challenges and competition should encourage habitualization.

Explored Solution/Task: Competitive Cooking

Users cook from same prompt, same ingredients options, then post photos to compare.

Competitive Cooking Stakeholders

Direct:

- Users (young adults living independently for first time)
 - Includes user's friends who become users themselves!

Indirect

- Sellers of ingredients chosen for challenges (local merchants, large grocery stores, etc.)
- Those living with/interacting with users while they cook/shop for groceries
- Chefs/Cookbooks/Sources of recipes either used in-app or used by users

Competitive Cooking Ethics (Tarot Cards)

Mother Nature

- Generally, our app is good for the environment encourages cooking at home, which is more sustainable (especially if users have ingredients at home already)
- A potentially harmful aspect is food waste - users may get more attached to "winning" competition or taking pictures than actually eating their creation
 - The absence of tangible rewards (e.g. money) should reduce risk of this issue.
 - We can also limit virtual rewards possible per day, to reduce possibility of person attempting to win every competition possible.

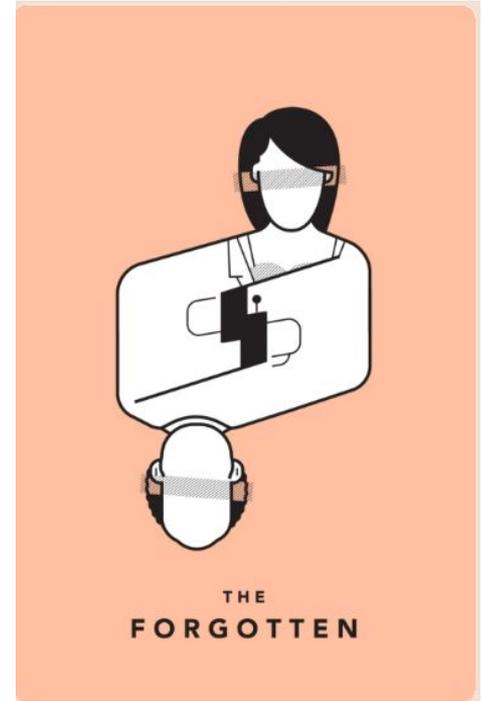


Q: If the environment was your client, how would your product change? What feedback would the environment give about your product? What is the most unsustainable behavior your product encourages?

Competitive Cooking Ethics (Tarot Cards)

The Forgotten

- Our user base may be more exclusive towards those with dietary restrictions – rewarding experimentation may reduce opportunities for these individuals to participate in the same way.
 - We can tailor our app to be more generalized towards the most common dietary restrictions, and allow users to create their own custom challenges that accommodate more extreme restrictions
 - Users may use challenges to help others better understand their experience of accommodating their own dietary restrictions!

Competitive Cooking Ethics (Tarot Cards)

The Siren

- Using our product too much would include users scrolling others' post excessively, or consistently try to undergo challenges in attempts to earn the virtual reward.
- Overuse would go against the goal of the app (focusing on exploring and making cooking enjoyable) in favor of an addictive need to acquire an artificial reward. This can lead to food waste or toxic interactions among users,.
- We can address overuse by emphasizing the fun, interactive nature of challenges, and limiting the number of challenges one can participate in and/or the number of rewards one can earn in a set time.

Task Breakdown

(Each row goes left to right)

Simple Tasks - Simple

Select recipe/challenge to cook

- Users will be presented a recipe to use **or**
- Users can choose among a limited (3) number of challenges to undertake for a virtual reward.
- These challenges come from a large bank, and can include ingredients, cooking styles, certain cuisines, etc.
- Expected Daily interactive usage.
- Simple because there is minimal additional effort (recipe/challenges premade)
- **Video Timestamp: ~0:20-0:26**

Check out what others have cooked!

- Users can see photos of others' challenges (friends or general population) for the past few days, and share opinions
- Like, comments, repost, other interactive measures of success
- Users can share their methods/techniques, get inspiration from what others have done, and receive thoughts/feedback from other users.
- Simple because users are likely accustomed to social media already, and performing this task can take as little as seconds!

Tasks - Moderate

Invite friends to participate in existing challenge

- Users can invite other friends to participate in an already-listed challenge.
- Both users receive information about the challenge's conditions, ingredients, and time of occurrence.
- Both users can share what they create and compare!
- Moderate because user needs to take some additional initiative (finding a challenge they like, finding a friend they think would like the challenge, actively sending the challenge, having the challenge be accepted by the friend).
 - Expectation that users share their results afterwards. This might be more intimidating for **very** beginning chefs/users who are less comfortable sharing what they've done.

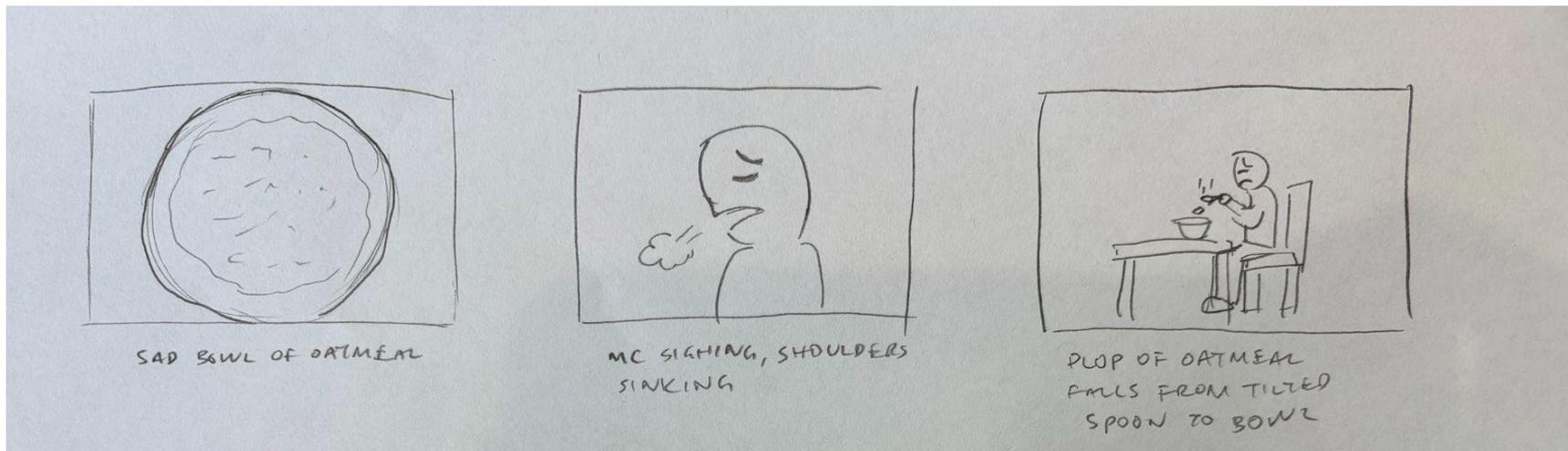
Tasks - Complex

Create a custom challenge!

- Users can create a custom challenge and send them to other users (either friends or the general user base) to explore/undergo.
 - Users can modify things such as time limit, ingredients list, culinary + dietary restrictions, banned cooking methods, or more.
- Complex task because it takes initiative and active experience to determine a combination of restrictions that makes a challenge both fun, but still possible for their target audience (friends or people in general)
 - Really pushes the limits of creativity on both the creator and undertaker's side.

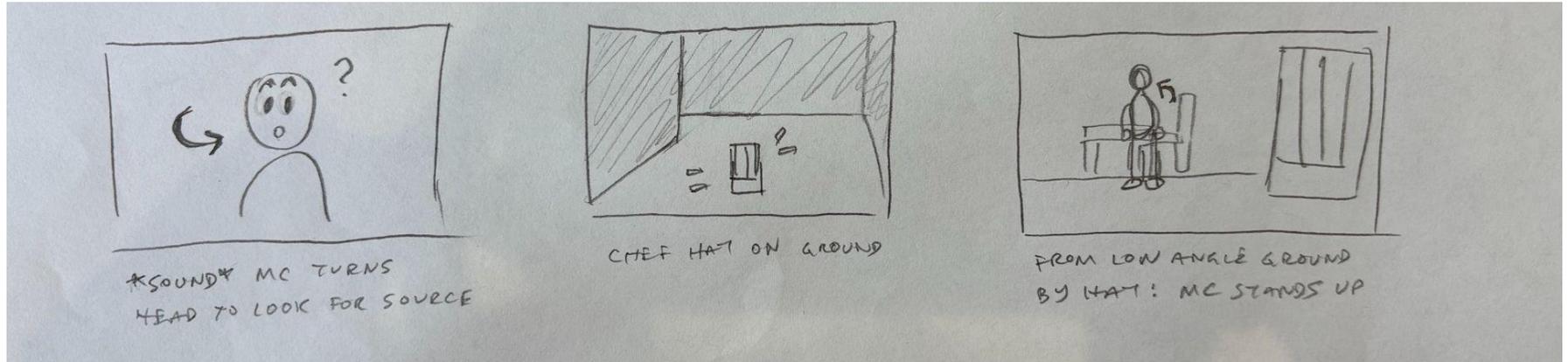

(chef hat represents app/the potential aesthetic reward/the sense of pride from cooking)



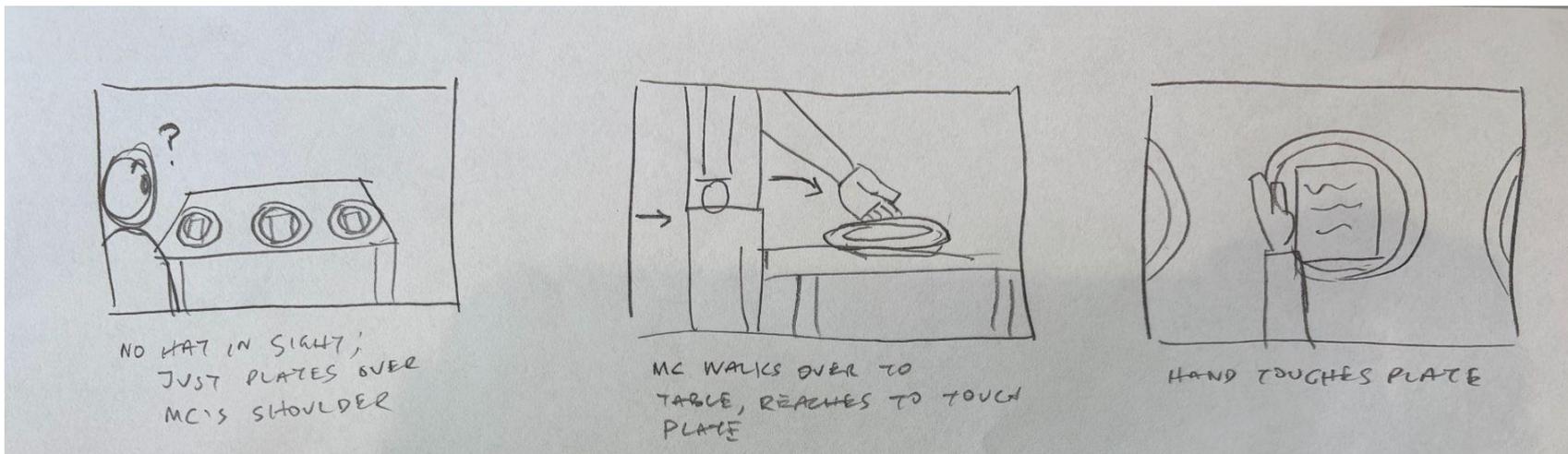

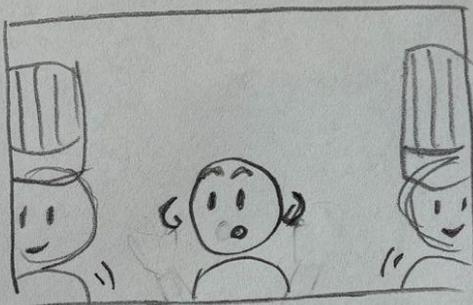
Potential challenges represented on each plate

Selects one— **Simple Task 1**



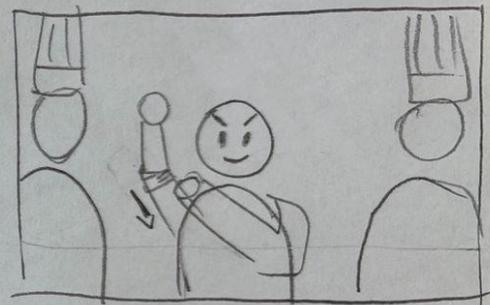

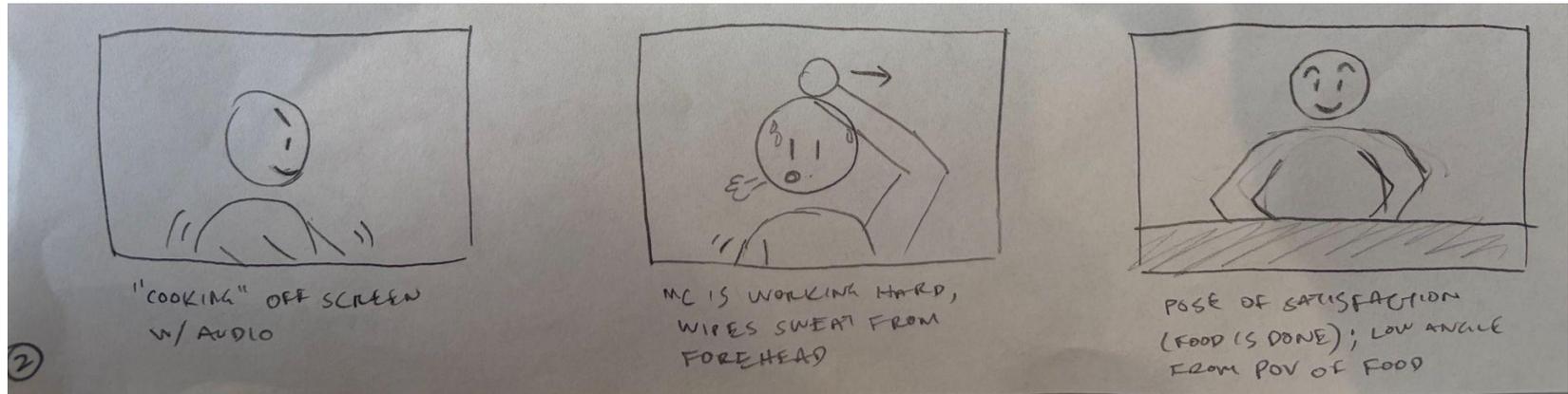

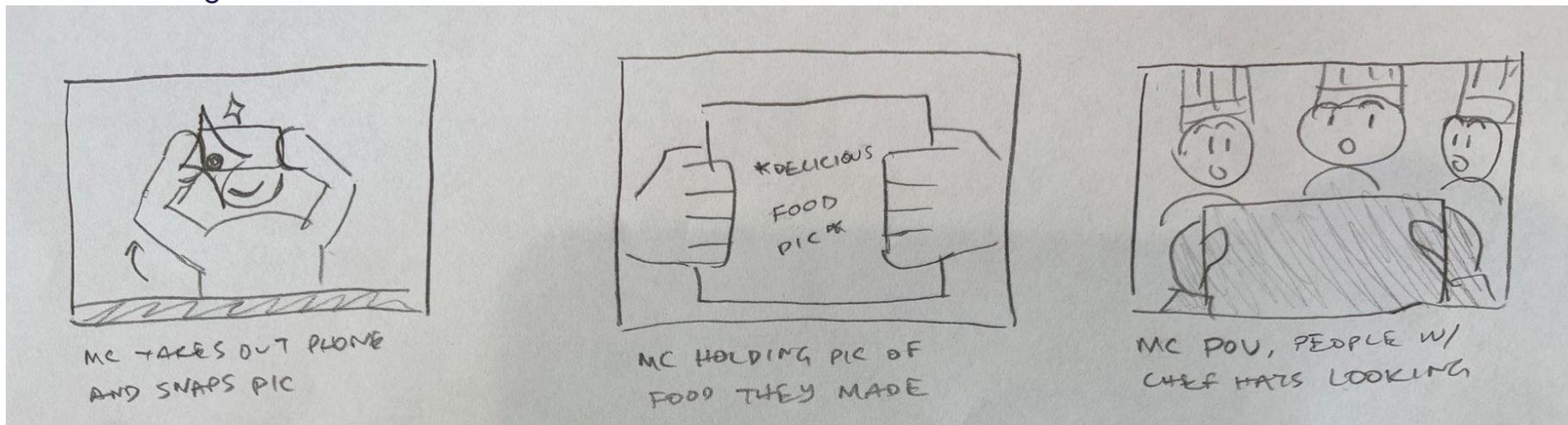

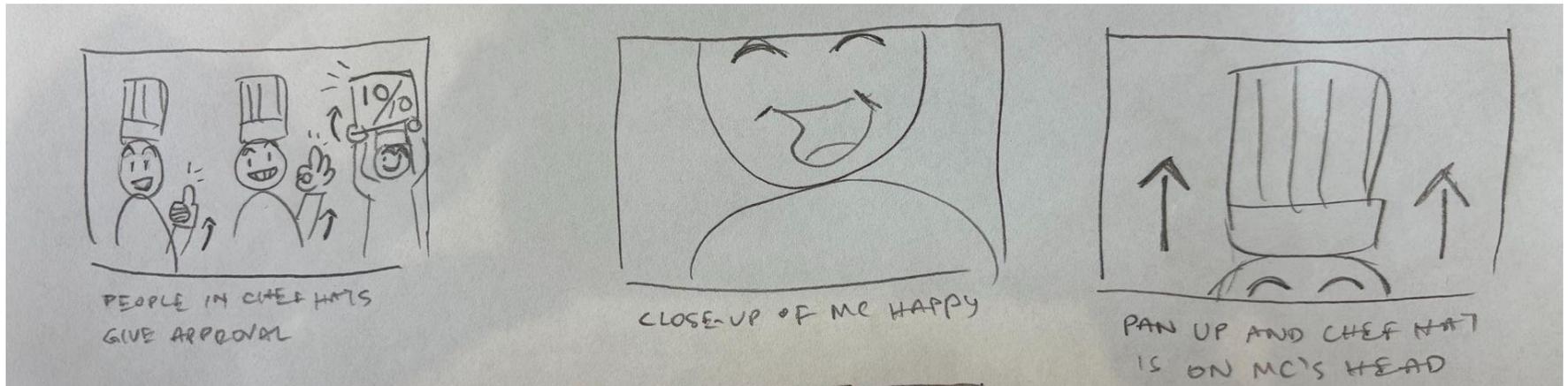

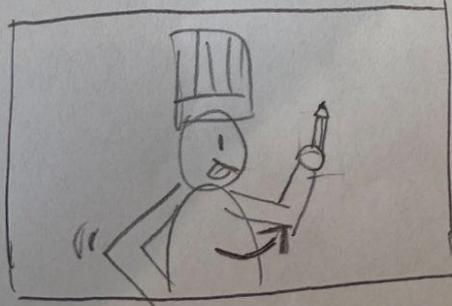

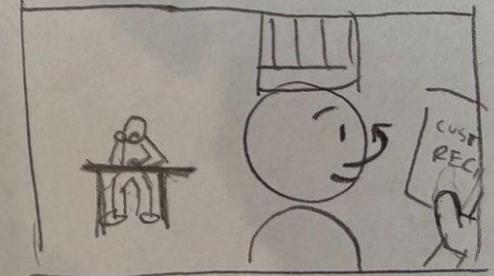

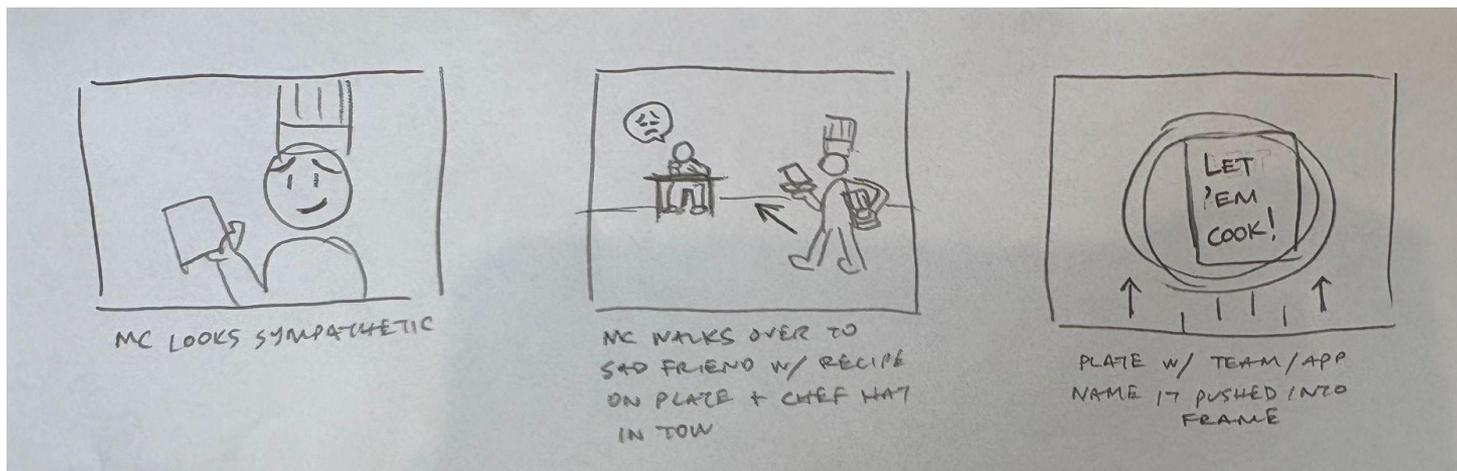
